Restoring Forested Land through NGC's Penny Pines Project

Piedmont District is proud to support NGC's "Penny Pines Project". The Natural Disasters/USA Fund was established in 1999 by NGC in



partnership with the US Department of Agriculture (USDA) Forestry Service. Many states continue to suffer from Natural Disasters: floods, wildfires, hurricanes, tornadoes, ice storms, earthquakes, development, and disease. In Virginia alone, according to state environmental groups, 16,000 acres of trees are lost annually to development and disease. Penny Pines donations are made in units of \$68.00. Donations are used by the USDA Forest Service or state forestry, supplementing federal funds to replace burnt, damaged, or destroyed trees.

Tips for Spring-Blooming Bulbs

We plant spring blooming bulbs in the fall because they need their "beauty sleep." Planting bulbs in the fall is a good investment for money spent, giving you years of seasonal color. The word 'bulb' is often used for any plant that can store food underground. The list includes not only tulips and daffodils (true bulbs) but also crocus (corms), anemone (tubers), lily-of-the valley (rhizomes), and ranunculus (tuberous roots).

Planting Requirements

- -The optimum pH for the soil is 6-7. A soil test will provide this information plus give recommendations to improve your soil.
- -The soil must drain well.
- -Select a site with at least 5-6 hours of direct sunlight a day.
- -Decide on a design. Bulbs are much more attractive when planted in mass design or drifts.
- -Select bulbs that are plump and firm. Discard any that are soft, rotted, moldy, dented, or nicked.
- -Spring flowering bulbs should be planted late September to mid-December.
- -The general rule of thumb for successful beautiful blooms is to plant them at a depth of two to three times the height of the bulb.
- -Tulips, daffodils, and hyacinths should be planted with the point of the bulb up and root downward.

If your goal is to plant in a drift or grouping, it is recommended to dig and loosen the entire bed to the proper depth. Press the bulbs into the soil and cover with soil. The planting should last longer in a fully excavated bed because soil will drain better. You will also be able to admire them from afar.

To provide needed moisture, water the bed and settle the soil. Cover the bed with mulch to minimize the effect of fluctuation in temperature and maintain moisture.

Maintenance Requirements: Post-Bloom Care

Cut off flowers when faded to prevent seed formation which allows more food to be stored in the bulbs underground.

After blooming, the foliage should NOT be removed or mowed off until it turns yellow and dies back naturally. The plant needs these leaves to manufacture nutrients that are stored in the bulb for next year's beautiful blooms.

If you do nothing else this week, get your bulbs. Then figure out where to plant them!

DESIGN 101

aka Floral Design made Easy!

Article One – The Basics

Does the idea of creating a floral design make you break out in a cold sweat? Would you like to be able to make floral designs but have no idea where to start? If so, please keep reading!

I have been asked to help Piedmont District members see the fun in creating floral arrangements. This will be accomplished with quarterly articles in the Piedmont District newsletter and by holding floral design workshops for Piedmont District members. We are hoping to hold our first class in the winter or spring of 2024. Look for more information in the *Footprints* winter edition.

This first article focuses on what you need to do <u>before</u> you start your design. The many decisions you make before cutting a stem will impact your resulting creation. You will need to decide which container to use, which flowers to include, and how you will keep your flowers in place.

Choice of Container - The most important characteristics of containers are that they are watertight and stable. Before using a container, always test it by filling it with water and placing it on newspaper or a towel. You will be able to see very quickly if the container is leaking, by the water spot that appears. If your container leaks, but you still want to use it, you may use a plastic liner in your container or perhaps spray the interior of the container with a sealant.

A heavy container will tend to be more stable than a lightweight one. Weight can always be added to the bottom of a container by adding stones or glass beads. A container with a wider base will be more stable than one with a parrow base

The color of the container will also impact your design. In general, when new to floral design, it is

better to choose containers that are solid black, brown, gray or green with a matte finish. This type of container will complement any flowers or design styles. Initially, it is best to avoid containers that are white, very bright or shiny. Glass containers can also be tricky to use, as you do not want to be able to see the flower stems in the container.

Choice of Mechanics – Mechanics are how you hold your plant material in the desired position. Mechanics should be easy to use and invisible in the final design. Two of the most common ways of holding stems in place are a pin holder or floral foam. A pin holder, also known as a kenzan or frog, is usually used when you are making a design with a limited amount of plant material. The best kenzans are heavy and have needles close together. They can be used for fresh or dried plant material.

The second common type of mechanic is floral foam. It comes in two types – one for dried plant materials and one for fresh. The floral foam for fresh plant material is called wet floral foam, as you must soak it in water before using it. Foam should always be placed on the surface of the water and allowed to absorb the water slowly.

Choice of Plant Materials – The plant material that you incorporate into your floral design should be a combination of various forms, colors and textures. These contrasting elements will create interest in your design.

Plant material comes in basically three different forms – linear, round and filler.

- Linear forms help establish the structural framework of the design. Examples of linear plant materials include decorative wood, sticks, branches, cattails, pussy willow, iris leaves, delphiniums, liatris, gladiolus, etc.
- Round forms include chrysanthemums, roses, lilies, Gerbera daisies, sunflowers, dahlias, tulips, etc.

 Filler plant material generally has smaller blooms. Fillers can include spray forms of roses and chrysanthemums, fern, statice, goldenrod, Limonium, hypericum berries, etc.

When choosing your plant material, color choice is also important. You will want to create color palettes that are pleasing to you. They may be different shades of a single color (monochromatic) or perhaps colors that are close together on the color wheel – for example reds, oranges, and yellows (analogous) or possibly colors that "pop" and are across from each other on the color wheel like purple and yellow (complementary). When choosing a color palette, I like to start with a bicolored or tricolored flower and then choose other flowers that will echo these colors.

You now have a good idea of the decisions you need to make before beginning your floral design: choose a container, choose a mechanic, and

choose your plant material. I hope this has given you some things to think about as you study the flowers at the grocery store or look at floral designs at your club meetings. You will never see floral arrangements the same way again!

If you are interested in learning more about basic floral design, Flower Show School Course I will be taught in Richmond on Wednesday, August 23. It is an opportunity to learn what makes a good design. Everyone is invited to participate. You are welcome just to come and learn. Taking the exam is optional. What Is the Impact of Climate Change on Birds?

Bird populations are declining around the world. While many factors contribute: habitat loss, outdoor cats, pesticides, and window collusions, it is increasingly clear that climate change is an important driver behind this worrying trend. For any species to survive with climate change, it will depend on how well they can adapt. Birds are impacted in many ways, both direct and indirect.

Direct Impacts

Climate change can alter where birds live, the timing of their migration patterns, egg laying, and even the sizes and shapes of their bodies. Data sets have shown that many North American bird species have been shifting their winter and breeding ranges northward over time, which means some birds have been seen further north than a few decades ago. Some measurements have shown that in many species, birds' bodies are getting smaller, and their wings are getting longer as global temperatures heat up. Smaller bodies may help disperse excess body heat in warming habitats.

Indirect Impacts

Drought and fire—Intense drought and more frequent wildfires can alter or destroy nesting areas and habitat upon which vulnerable species rely.

Sea-level rise—As sea-levels rise, some species such as the saltmarsh sparrows can easily be drowned by high tides. Their survival will depend on how quickly new marshes form further inland. Disease—Drought and warmer temperatures are driving the spread of West Nile virus. The virus is threatening wild birds, especially corvids such as crows and jays.

Timing mismatches—Many birds initiate their northward flight based on day length and not temperature, so because of a shift in climate conditions, seasonal food sources that they rely

on, such as caterpillars, may already be past their peak for the year, reducing breeding success.

What can we as garden club members do?

- Plant trees and include native plants in your landscape as food sources for the birds.
- Try to reduce your carbon footprint by making wise choices on how we live and travel.
- Educate and promote garden club projects in your community that are bird friendly.
