Piedmont District 2022 Grant Awards

Jean Fender, PD Grants Chairman

Congratulations to the following clubs who received grants for their landscaping projects this year.

Sleepy Hollow Garden Club is celebrating its 60th anniversary this year and wants to create a garden where they meet at Epiphany Lutheran Church – a garden to attract birds, bees, and butterflies, serving as a place of interest for church members and as a learning opportunity for children at the church's preschool. The garden will be comprised of native pants and will be a natural, balanced garden without the use of pesticides and fertilizers. The club will enhance the site by the placement of a Bluebird Nest Box and use signage about the plants and their pollinators.

Thomas Jefferson Garden Club is starting Phase I of a project at Sabot School at Stony Point where they meet. They plan to renovate the landscape by replacing existing shrubbery in front of the school with a focus on native plants including pollinators. This will benefit the children who attend and outdoor classrooms in learning about invasive species, native plants, the process of pollination, life cycles, animal habitats, and plant identification.

Lastly, Woodland Pond Garden Club will be rejuvenating an existing youth garden area at O.B. Gates Elementary School in Chesterfield, consisting of 7 raised beds started in 2019, but because of COVID, the area has not been maintained since then. The Club plans to make the garden area accessible for students to learn about plants and food sources. Initially the raised beds will be allocated for pollinators, spring veggies, fall arrivals, and sensory plants, using organic products and seeds.





Why Do Birds Peck at Windows?

One of the upsides to gardening is creating a habitat that attracts birds and other pollinators. We see all the "common" birds in our rural garden regularly: turkeys, crows, grackles, woodpeckers, flickers, cardinals, robins, jays, bluebirds, finches, chickadees, and a menagerie of beloved small brown and grey birds.

Add grosbeaks, hummingbirds, orioles, indigo buntings, tanagers, and warblers during the summer.

We see predators, too: hawks, bald eagles, and owls. Unfortunately, we've also found dead birds that fly into windows when they race away from these skilled hunters. Tape or stickers on window glass can help redirect these frightened flyers.

But most frustrating for us are birds that peck relentlessly at windows—over and over, following us from room to room and flinging themselves at the glass. We develop sympathetic headaches watching them.

Male cardinals excel at this odd behavior. One in our garden began doing this at Thanksgiving and is still at it in May. We've tried everything to get him to stop. Initially, we were sure our three dogs bounding around would end the behavior. They were no deterrent; they've welcomed him as a new pet.

Sometimes, he bangs 20 times/minute for several hours. Yes, we've counted!

Why do birds do this? Books say they're territorial, especially during mating/nesting season—and believe they are chasing away the 'other' male bird they see reflected. OR they eat so many fermented berries in winter that they're drunk and behave stupidly. OR they see plants/floral fabric through the windows they want to investigate.

How do you stop this behavior? Pull down shades to block the view. Tape predator images on the glass. Remove fermented fruit. Prop up a mirror in the garden to redirect them away from windows. But none of these 'solutions' worked for us.

The only thing that stops *our cardinal* is OPEN windows. Our windows open outwards and that gives him pause. If we crack open windows in most rooms simultaneously, he stops pecking. But as the summer heats up, that's a problem.

His mate is nesting, so with luck, he will grow bored with us and start taking care of his offspring soon.



In his book Nature's Best
Hope: A New Approach to
Conservation That Starts in
Your Yard, entomologist and
author Douglas Tallamy
proposes the largest
conservation initiative ever
conceived. The concept would

help mitigate the climate crisis, improve the environment, and combat urban sprawl with a healthy new 20-million-acre ecosystem for wildlife. This monumental conservation effort begins in our own back yards.

For many years we have focused on beautiful green lawns, lawns that require regular upkeep with intensive watering, pesticides, herbicides, and gaspowered mowers. A lawn is a dead zone that offers zero food or habitat benefits to nature. And lawns represent 40 million acres of land in the U.S. Tallamy proposes that if every landowner in American converted "half of his or her lawn to productive native plant communities," we could convert 20 million acres of wasteland into a healthy ecosystem for birds and wildlife." According to Tallamy, the connectivity of all the habitats created would be larger than "The Everglades, Yellowstone, Yosemite, Grand Tetons, Canyonlands, Mount Rainier, North Cascades, Badlands, Olympia, Sequoia, Grand Canyon, Denali, and The Great Smokies combined."

The book is filled with insightful and useful information. The author suggests we should think of our lawn space as area rugs instead of wall-to-wall carpet. By converting half of our lawns to habitat, together we can play an active role in environmental stewardship.


